Call to Worship


The Earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and all that dwells therein.

Act of Confession

God's creation is being abused and violated.

We as human beings often see ourselves as separate from creation, not woven into the web of life.

We are quick to blame and judge others rather than accept responsibility for the part that we play in destroying our environment.

We use more than our share of earth's resources.

We are responsible for massive pollution of earth, water, and sky.

We thoughtlessly drop garbage around our homes, schools, churches, places of work, fields, and places of play. Much of the world struggles for survival; good food, clean water, adequate homes.

We squander resources on technologies of destruction. Bombs come before bread. We are killing the earth:

as mountains of garbage pile up, as uranium and nuclear wastes threaten life for centuries to come, as we use trees faster than they can regrow, and as our precious agricultural land loses its fertility.

We are killing the waters:

as toxic chemicals and human wastes are dumped into lakes, rivers, and oceans, as fish and plants die from acid rain, and as groundwater is poisoned.

We are killing the skies:

as the global atmosphere heats up from chemical gases, as the ozone layer is destroyed, and as clean air is poisoned by car and truck pollution.

We confess these sins to you our God, Creator of the universe. We have not loved the earth as you love it.

First Reading: Job 12:7-10

⁷"But ask the animals, and they will teach you; the birds of the air, and they will tell you; ⁸ask the plants of the earth, and they will teach you; and the fish of the sea will declare to you. ⁹Who among all these does not know that the hand of the LORD has done this? ¹⁰In his hand is the life of every living thing and the breath of every human being.

Second Reading: Chief Seattle

You must teach your children that the ground beneath their feet is the ashes of our grandfathers. Whatever befalls the earth, befalls the sons of the earth. If men spit upon the ground, they spit upon themselves.

This we know. The earth does not belong to man; man belongs to the earth. This we know. All things are connected like the blood which unites one family. All things are connected.

Whatever befalls the earth befalls the sons of the earth. Man did not weave the web of life; he is merely a strand in it. Whatever he does to the web, he does to himself...."

We lift them to the Lord.




Benediction
